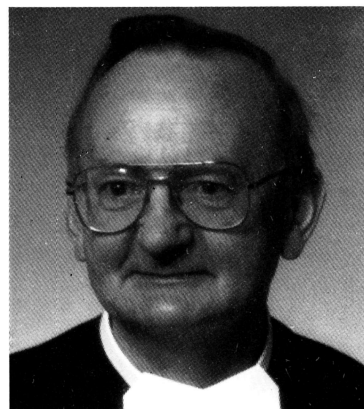

THE FOUNDER

BROTHER CAJETAN FERGUS (1920-1986)

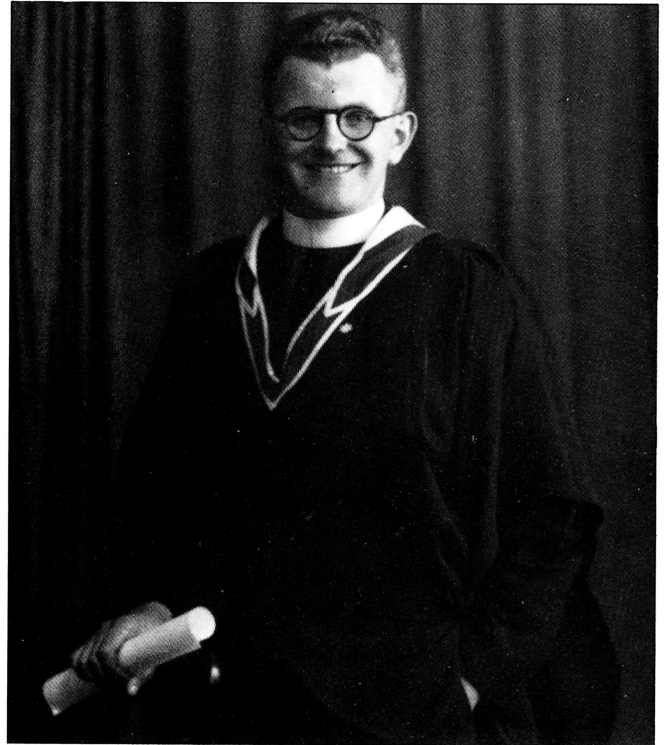

Having been Principal of St. John's Secondary School, Ballyfermot, from 1956 to 1968, Bro. Cajetan came to Raheny in August 1968 with a mission to establish a secondary school for boys which would cater for the local area. The school was still a blueprint on the architect's drawing board and with limited resources he had to be content with pre-fabricated classrooms, the humble beginnings of Ardscoil la Salle. Brother Cajetan came armed with a slash-hook, cut his way into the empty site and with hard work, enthusiasm and sheer doggedness had a school up-and-running for the first 90 pupils within weeks. In 1971 he felt that he had had enough of school-building and set his sights for the missions in Africa.

Mayo-born Brother Cajetan had qualified as a Primary Teacher in 1944. He graduated from U.C.D. with a B.A. in Mathematics and Mathematics-Physics in 1950. He was a brilliant student and a born mathematics teacher. Often he would annoy Leaving Cert. students by walking around doing most of the Honours Maths Leaving Cert. paper in his head and declaring: "It wasn't too bad this year!"

Bazza in Nigeria was to welcome this white-haired, bespectacled middle-aged missionary in 1971. With his usual zeal, he set about the establishment of a Training College for the natives and became its principal.

By 1986, the hard work, the hot climate and failing health were beginning to take their toll and he was advised to move to Oturkpo.

On the 18th November 1986, Mike Bazza, as he was then called, died peacefully in his sleep. His body was carried 500 miles to his beloved Bazza where earlier the natives had conferred on him the title Chief.

Brother Thomas Lavin remembers the funeral: "On the wall above the grave, someone had hung red and green flowers. Mike would have liked that - the Mayo colours were dear to his heart, as he was laid to rest for ever so far from his beloved land. Underneath, a simple epitaph was written:

'They who have instructed many unto justice shall shine as stars for all eternity'."

INTRODUCTION

When Bro. Cajetan took the first tentative steps to establish a boy's secondary school in St. Benedict's Parish the priority was to secure facilities and equipment for the education of the first 90 pupils. I trust that Ardscoil La Salle in 1993 is in keeping with the vision he had for the school and that he would be proud of the tradition that has evolved.

Over the last 25 years - a period of very rapid change in Irish education brought about by the introduction of "Free Education" and burgeoning pupil numbers - many challenges have been faced and dealt with in a professional and laudatory manner. Staffing has always been a critical factor, often the stresses were great, but I must express my gratitude to past and present staff who have given unselfishly of their time and energy, and who have given of their best in educating the pupils in accordance with the ideals of Jean-Baptiste De La Salle. I wish to pay tribute, also, to Bro. Cajetan, Bro. Benignus and Bro. Brendan, who signposted the way forward.

The quest for adequate facilities and equipment to meet the needs of an expanding school population has always been paramount. It is only in latter times that the task has become more manageable and the main emphasis has been to stay in step with changes in technology. The legacy of the De La Salle Brothers coupled with the very hard work of a marvellous Parents' Association is that Ardscoil La Salle operates in very fine facilities equipped to a high standard. In recent years much expenditure has been accounted for in the purchase of electronic typewriters, computer hardware and software, video recorders, and CAD/CAM equipment, to mention but a few developments. A splendid sports hall has also been built providing a tremendous facility for the pupils and is extensively used in the evening time by the local community. Such developments could not have taken place without fundraising, great credit being due to the Parents' Association under the guiding hand of the long-serving Secretary, John Burns, and, at present, under the leadership of the energetic Chairperson, Maura Lally. Many thanks for their assistance and continued support over the years.

In 1978, a milestone in the school's development was reached when the first cohort of girls entered its doors and the Marist Sisters joined the Staff. At the time, this was a

revolutionary step for a religious order of brothers to embark on in Dublin City. It charted a much different and a more enriching course of development for the school. It brought with it an acceleration in curriculum expansion, moving from a narrow band of subjects to one which is now very wide, offering 18 subjects at Junior Level and 23 at Senior Level, together with a Transition Year Option and Vocational Preparation and Training Programme. It is a broad comprehensive curriculum which caters for all interests and abilities and which is constantly reviewed to meet the changing needs of pupils. To this end, German and a new age subject, Technology, have been introduced.

Participation in extra-curricular activities is actively encouraged. The range on offer is large, extending from Gaelic Football, Hurling, Soccer, Badminton, Basketball to Debating, Hill Walking, Drama and Student Exchanges. Staff give freely of their time and expertise in providing this important service dedicated to the welfare of the students, helping them reach their potential. A debt of gratitude is owed to all for their great work.

In these early years of the 1990's we are faced with the challenges set out in the Green Paper, "Education for a Changing World". There is much in this document which could be beneficial but, equally, there is a need for consultation and discussion among the partners in education before legislation is put in place. I trust that the school is well placed to progress and take up the challenges ahead.

On a final note, I wish the recently retired Ciaran Finneran a long and happy retirement. I am very grateful to all the hard-working parents, teachers and past pupils who have been instrumental in organising the Silver Jubilee Year events, to Mrs. B. McGuirk for typing the originals for this publication, to our hard-working editor, Ms. B. O Meadhra, and to our contributors, one and all.

AN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

This year Ardscoil La Salle is celebrating its Silver Jubilee. As one who was so close to its beginning, it is with a deep sense of pride and immense gratitude that I write a brief history of the school. Pride in the growth and expansion that has taken place; gratitude to Almighty God for the many blessings bestowed on the school; gratitude also to the many people - clerical and lay - who have given of their time, energy, moral and financial support over the years.

Ardscoil La Salle opened its doors to its first pupils on September 7th, 1968. Ireland had come through the depressing, stagnant years of the 1950's into the Lemass era, 1959-1966. Donagh O'Malley launched his free education scheme, opening up education to everyone. Dublin began to grow outwards and new housing estates began to spring up. Among those were Grange, Woodbine, Edenmore, Kilbarrack and Donaghmede. The then Archbishop of Dublin, Dr. J.C. McQuaid, asked the Brothers to open a school in the area. True to its mission, the Church was in there with schools at the same time as the people were arriving. Br. Cajetan, the first Principal, was seen with scythe and spade in hand clearing the grounds where the school now stands, just as the new residents were clearing the mud from their doorsteps.



A total of 84 boys were admitted on that first day. They were divided into three classes. There was no water and no electricity. The school furniture consisted of a few lounge chairs, seven small coffee tables and some blackboards. In the words of Br. Cajetan - "the Staff - four members - were disappointed, but the pupils accepted it."

Plans for the new school were finalised during the winter months of '68-'69, but a long delay followed as the Department was short of money. It was not until March 1970 that the permanent building was started. This first phase, consisting of the Library and adjacent classrooms, was ready for September 1972. Br. Cajetan surrendered the reins in August 1971, having done the pioneering work. He was succeeded by Br. Benignus (Cormac Hilliard).

The number of pupils increased and all available space was used fully. Br. Benignus opened the school at night to local groups for meetings, various activities and adult education. On Sundays, and Holy Days, it was used as a Mass Centre to accommodate the overflow from St.

Benedict's. Thus it really became a school for the community.

Negotiations with the Department for Stage 2 of the building were opened in January 1974. It was May 1976 before this stage was commenced - the Home Economics Wing, the Administrative area, the Metalwork, Woodwork and Engineering Rooms. These were ready for use in September 1977. Br. Benignus moved on to become Principal of St. John's and was replaced by Br. Brendan.

The Department of Education was anxious that the school should now 'go co-educational'. This was an unusual venture for a Secondary School at the time and the Marist Sisters were asked to join the staff. The experiment has proved very successful. Most educationalists would say it was a natural progression from the Primary Schools - most of which were co-educational. Our first girls entered in September 1978 and this surely must be regarded as a high point in the school's history.

Br. Brendan realised the 'coping stone' was missing - a School Gymnasium. Department approval was sought and obtained. The Parents' Committee mounted a massive fund-raising campaign. With a considerable input from the Brothers, all debt on the Gym was cleared by its completion in 1987. At long last the pre-fabs were demolished and the new Sports Hall was constructed. It was officially opened later that year. The school now had a Sports Complex and the building programme was complete.

In the Spring of 1988, a Board of Management was set up and a new Principal appointed - Mr. Gerard McCaul. The curriculum, already very wide, was broadened even further. Emphasis was placed on modern languages, computer science and related subjects. Contacts were made with European Schools. There has been a great exchange of students of Ardscoil La Salle and a school in Belgium. This exchange is set to continue. De La Salle can now boast of a broad curriculum second to none.

Ardscoil La Salle has been twenty five years a-growing.

Solid foundations have been laid. The Principal and Staff look forward with confidence to the Golden Jubilee, twenty five years from now. Long may the school continue to help its pupils take their place in the modern world.

The CURRICULUM 1968 – 1993

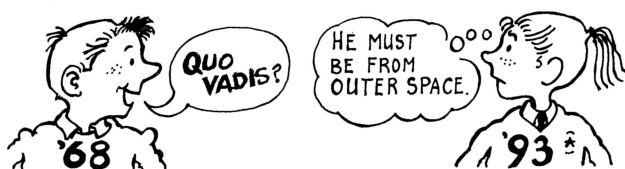
For many students entering Ardscoil La Salle in recent years the choice of subjects has been a major concern. Should one take Metalwork or Business Studies? Technology or Art? French or German? For the students of 1968, however, there was no such problem. They had no choice.

The 85 boys who enrolled in 1968 studied the usual core subjects - English, Irish, Maths., History, Geography, Science and Religious Education. In addition, depending on the class a pupil was in, they studied one or more of the following - Latin, French, Commerce and Mechanical Drawing. A wider range of subjects could not be provided because of the very limited number of teachers, and limited space. There were four prefabricated classrooms. In 1969, however, Art was added to the list.

In 1971, classrooms became available in the new school - the rooms at present numbered 1 to 12, and 23 to 33. The pioneering group who had entered in 1968 were now in Fifth Year and had the following subjects to choose from - Physics, Chemistry, Biology, History, Geography, Economics, Business Organisation, French, Spanish and Latin.

Woodwork was added to the curriculum for the 1972 entrants, and classes in the subject were held in the present room 2 and 3. Art was added to the Fifth Year Options - the Art classes being held in the present rooms 27 and 28. Spanish, however, was dropped.

Latin disappeared from the Junior Curriculum in 1973 and 1974 from the Fifth Year options - a sign of the changing times as the sciences, commercial and technical subjects gained greater prominence at the expense of the humanities.



Accountancy was added to the Fifth Year options in 1975, and was followed in 1976 by Technical Drawing.

Phase Two of the school building was completed in 1978. New special rooms then became available for the various technical subjects and for Art. That year also saw the enrolment of girls for the first time. Home Economics and Metalwork were included for the incoming First Years.

In 1981, Home Economics and Typing were added to the senior curriculum, followed by Engineering in 1986 and Construction Studies in 1987.

Applied Maths. has been available for a number of years as an optional extra subject, and in 1990 German was made available on a similar basis for seniors. Computer Studies have been possible since 1986 when a Computer Room was equipped. Finally, at Junior Level, Technology and German were included for incoming First Years in 1990.

Although some degree of choice had existed for a number of years for First Years, it is only since 1989 that pupils have been given a trial period in each of the optional subjects before making their final choices. Science is studied by all pupils.

Physical Education has always been an important element in the school curriculum. However, until the Gymnasium was built in 1986, Physical Education was limited to team games such as hurling and football. All junior classes are now given one timetabled Physical Education session per week.

In the spiritual domain, all pupils attend Religious Education classes. They are encouraged to attend retreats and seminars, and to live their lives as caring and responsible Christians.

Curriculum development and innovation has played an important part in meeting the needs of pupils. The Pre-Employment Course was established in 1980 to cater for pupils who, having completed the Intermediate Certificate Course, were not ready to leave school but did not wish to take the Leaving Certificate Course. It has served pupils well in preparing them for employment, and has evolved to meet changing needs, being known in more recent years as the VPTP course.

The introduction in 1991 of the Transition Year Option should help to ensure that pupils who take it are more mature when leaving school, and better prepared for the Leaving Certificate Examination, and for life.

Apart from the developments outlined here, the new Junior Certificate has brought the revision of many subject courses and new subject names.

REFLECTIONS ON DE LA SALLE

THE VERY FIRST CLASS

JOHN BURNS ('68-'73)

The 1968 school term had already begun in Ardscoil La Salle when I started as a student there. My family had just moved to Dublin from County Clare, where I had been attending Secondary School in an old, imposing, grey brick building, lumbered with traditions, and surrounded by high walls. I was relieved to leave it and come to a school where there were no walls, no grey bricks, no traditions, no buildings in fact except for a green prefabricated structure which was to be the nucleus of Ardscoil La Salle for our first three years there.

There were over eighty students in the first year group and only two of us - Brendan McDermott and myself - came from Grange Park. At that stage Grange Park and Woodbine were brand new estates and Kilbarrack, Donaghmede and the Donahies did not exist. The rest of the group were from Raheny, Clontarf, Edenmore and Artane.

For that academic year we were Ardscoil La Salle. There was nobody ahead of or behind us. As a result, the relationship that existed between ourselves and the teachers was less formal, more open and relaxed than I had been used to. The teachers seemed more like ordinary human beings than the distant figures of authority that I had been exposed to in my previous school. Because we were the 'king-pins' that year; because the teachers were new to the school and because the building wasn't exactly imposing, we felt unfettered and it showed sometimes.

As a group of people, the 1968 class got on fairly well together. During that first year we got to know who the 'hard men' were, who the clever ones were, who was good at soccer and Gaelic and who could not be trifled with because of their tempers. Pecking orders came into being which stayed with us throughout our five years in the school. They weren't rigid but I remember years later, when we were in fourth or fifth year, we were very surprised when someone junior and new to the school took a swing at the person we regarded as the hard man of our year and of the school in general.

We were lucky to have in our midst two socialists who added spice to the class discussions we had in our first year and the subsequent years. Brian Duff and Brendan Cooney provided a cutting edge to our debates on whether God existed and the morality of the Vietnam War which was raging at the time. For years after I left secondary school I expected to see Brian emerging as a left wing politician. When I did meet him years later in Raheny he told me he was an accountant working for an American multinational! Thus are the expectations of youth confounded.

I haven't been back to the school in twenty years, nor have I seen many of the class of '68 since we split up in 1973. From time to time I've bumped into one of them on the street, helped him up, given him a few bob to buy a bottle of cheap wine (Joke!). No, really, it's always been a pleasure to see them and I look forward to encountering them at some of the events organised for the Silver Jubilee.

NINETEEN YEARS ON . . .

KEVIN WARREN ('69-'74)

I left Ardscoil La Salle in 1974 to take up a job as executive officer in the Department of Agriculture. A few years later I joined the Revenue Commissioners as an Inspector of Taxes and in 1980 I joined Craig Gardner, Chartered Accountants, as a taxation consultant. Since 1987, I am a partner in that firm specialising in taxation. Along the way I picked up a B.Sc. degree and qualified as a chartered accountant. I am also a member of the Institute of Taxation.

My current job involves tax planning for a broad spectrum of business i.e. multinationals setting up in Ireland, Irish quoted companies, and Irish private companies. I also assist many senior executives and wealthy people with planning their personal tax affairs. There is never a dull moment and as you can imagine, I am always kept busy. Although I work long hours, I enjoy my job!

I have fond memories of my time in Ardscoil La Salle. I just can't believe it is nineteen years since I left school (Seamus McHugh tells me that I can add correctly).

Some snap shot views that I have of the school are:

the discos held in the main hall; locking ourselves in a classroom on the top floor on the day we were leaving school; a "smoking room" for pupils; a sad memory of the large number of pupils who left school after Inter Cert (I hope that this is still not the case); our petite lady French teacher who became one of the "lads"

All in all I have some good memories of my school days and I am looking forward to meeting many old friends at the school re-unions.

A CALL FROM BRUSSELS

It is hard to believe that it is twenty years since I came to Ardscoil la Salle as a 'fresher' and harder still to believe that I left it fifteen years ago. The school I remember is very different from the school of today. Physically the school was much smaller - the main building was half its present size. It wasn't co-ed of course then and all the first years 'did time' in the infamous 'pre-fabs'.

When I started in 1973 the school was very young and still finding its feet. I remember a very relaxed relationship between students and staff, partly helped by the enlightened views of the then head Br. Benignus. There were many colourful characters among the teaching staff such as 'Timmo', 'Fitzer' and others we will not name for reasons of

discretion. Despite the fact that the school was in its early years, the standard of teaching was high and the education I received has served me well.

After Ardscoil la Salle, I went to Trinity, where I graduated in 1982 with a degree in Natural Sciences (Biochemistry). Afterwards, I did postgraduate research and obtained a Ph.D in molecular and cellular biology, specialising in Tropical Diseases. Since then I have worked as a Postdoctoral Fellow in Trinity College, Cambridge. At present, I am engaged in research at the University of Brussels.

FROM SCHOOLING TO BANKING

Hi, my name is John O'Carroll. I attended Ardscoil La Salle from '77 to '82. It was a time of great change. In 1978 the school became co-educational, which meant that my year was the last all-boys year in the school. With the arrival of the girls came a whole lot of "new responsibilities" according to Brother Brendan. It also saw the building change quite radically. Two new wings were added to the school. These included the woodwork/metalwork wing and also the home economics wing. The school staff changed to include a number of nuns from a nearby convent.

During 5th year, a group of friends including myself started broadcasting Radio La Salle - a high-powered entertainment programme which was transmitted every Friday morning through the school intercom system. We covered a wide range of topics from school sporting achievements to the visit of the head of the De La Salle Order.

After completing the leaving certificate in 1982, it was time to go to university or get a job. I chose the latter. Compared to today, the job opportunities would probably seem luxurious, but at the time it didn't seem that easy. In September of that year, I was offered a permanent pensionable position in the Civil

Service but only stayed there for 7 months and, in June '83, I joined the Bank of Ireland.

I started working in the Fairview branch as a cashier and remained there for 5 years. During that time some of the jobs I did included cashier, foreign exchange and customer service. When the Fairview branch closed I was transferred to Marino branch for a short time and from there to Coolock branch, where I am at present.

There is great variety in the work I do. One week I could be involved in cash, the next I might be accessing and reviewing and controlling a lending portfolio. Recently I have had the opportunity to visit a number of branches within the region in which I work (Dublin North) to train staff on a new computer system which the bank has introduced.

In 1988 I married Gráinne and we live quite close to the school in Raheny. We are expecting our first baby in June. I am still in contact with a number of friends I met when I went to De La Salle: Colm McDermott now works in London, David Dodd owns a shop in Waterford and David Pearson also works for the Bank of Ireland.

It was September 1982 when I started in the De la Salle School. It seems like years ago, yet I can remember it vividly. The last two years I spent in the De la Salle, I must admit, were the best. Everything began to come together. I began to plan my career as a nurse and made some very good friends, who are still good friends to this day. And of course I have to mention the romance that began at

the end of 6th year with one of my school mates, John Kilcar, to whom I am now happily engaged and we are getting married on April 12th, 1994. So 'THANK YOU' De la Salle, you are partly responsible for that, as for many others!

After wishing for months that the Leaving Certificate was over and done with, I must admit I was very sad and lonely leaving school and leaving a type of security I would never have again. This phase of my life was over and I had to try and grow up even more and look for work.

After leaving school I tried desperately for a year to get into a General Hospital to train as a nurse, which I must admit was a very difficult task, and unfortunately is still very difficult today. One thing I learned in school kept me going. That was if you do your best and are determined and positive enough, you will eventually see your dream turn into reality.

On the 19th of September 1988, I started as a Student Nurse in Beaumont Hospital. I had to live in the Richmond Hospital for eight months, which to me was like leaving home, and was a huge step to take.

To this day I will never forget my days in the De la Salle and all the great teachers (though I might not have thought so at the time!!), and I would advise any young person going to the De la Salle, to enjoy school, get involved in as many things as you can and make the most of it.

Most people are of the opinion that their school days are the best days of their lives. I believe, however, that a lot depends upon the school in question. I remember well my first few weeks in secondary school, settling into a new environment, becoming acquainted with the teachers and acquiring many new friends. After the five years it felt as if I knew every corner of the school, every mark on the floor, every picture in the library and every inch of the school grounds. It had become almost like a second home to me and many others in which friendships had grown and developed between fellow pupils and teachers alike.

It would be impossible to recall all of my memories in such a short space, plenty and sometimes unusual as they were. Despite the hard work a lot of good times were had by all, especially in the latter years. I have a special vivid memory of an incident in first year when a particular teacher, annoyed by the example which some boisterous fifth years were setting for his first year class, drew a dot on the blackboard, told us not to take our eyes off it, rushed out of the room to reprimand the boisterous few leaving a perplexed class behind him who in their innocence or fear did exactly what he said. He did not succeed with this the second time around.

I also remember the great enjoyment had by all in staging productions during the drama festivals which took place over the years. In working together as a team we learned much more about each other and ourselves than we could ever have learned in any other place. Skills and knowledge were passed on from teacher to pupil, skills which will stand us well for the rest of our lives. I personally feel that this school has given me more opportunities than I could ever have got in another school. Although I am now adjusting to another new environment my memories from Ardscoil La Salle will always have an extra special place in my heart. Thanks to Mr. McCaul, my teachers and my friends, my days in school were both enjoyable and unforgettable. Thank you for the encouragement and thank you for the continual support. Those were the formative days of my life and I will never forget them, whatever the future may bring.

PRE-EMPLOYMENT/V.P.T. in Ardscoil La Salle

On foot of an E.C. recommendation, the Department of Education introduced pre-employment courses in designated second level schools in 1978. The purpose of the new course was to attempt to alleviate the problem of unemployment among young people by preparing them for working life and providing a closer link between general education and vocational training. The first pre-employment course was introduced into Ardscoil La Salle in 1980. The main instigator behind the project was Mr. Tony Downes who got the project off the ground. Later Mr. Stephen Jordan replaced Mr. Downes as co-ordinator of the new programme. Initially 25 students were chosen to start the pre-employment course in September 1980.

L.E.C. CO-ORDINATOR

Pre-employment courses consisted of three main areas: General studies, Personal and Social Development, Technical Knowledge and Work Experience. The Technical Studies area of the course proved of particular interest and value to students and the general satisfaction rating of pupils and teachers solidified the course in its early years and placed it on a firm footing. Projects undertaken in the technical modules included the nurturing of a lawn and flowers in the Capuchin plot by the Horticulture class; the sale of Christmas tree stands, framed picture prints, pokers, shovels, etc.) from the Construction and Light Engineering classes; and the hands-on examination of a motor car engine in the Electronics class.

Work Experience was, and is, arguably the most exciting aspect of the pre-employment course. Students are on work-experience for two weeks each term in a variety of different workplaces, e.g., furniture factories, garages, supermarkets, butcher shops, offices, printing companies, lounges, hotels. The success of this aspect of the course is very much dependent on the goodwill of local businesses. The school is particularly grateful to all who have co-operated with the school over the years.

In 1985, the E.C. offered monthly allowances (E.S.F. grants) to students on work-experience courses. Pre-employment courses were re-vamped, and given a broader outline, and Department of Education approval for such courses was extended to all second level schools. Such courses were known from then on as Vocational Preparation and Training Programmes (V.P.T.P.). The provision of these monthly allowances greatly encouraged students to join the V.P.T. class, and it also helped to keep class attendances high, but unfortunately after three years the payment of these allowances ceased without much explanation, much to the dismay of the students.

In 1988, the year of the Dublin Millennium, the V.P.T. class (which at this stage was co-educational) undertook a project to highlight the history, culture and architecture of the city. This was done by the



construction of a model of O'Connell Street. The work was co-ordinated by Mr. J. Slattery with the help of Mr. D. Madden and Mr. J. Keane, and the exhibition was opened by Mr. Sean Kenny, deputising for the Lord Mayor, and was attended by many public representatives. The model is still on display in the school.

Pre-employment/V.P.T. classes in the school over the years have also embarked on many extra-school activities. The classes have regularly gone to Outdoor Education Centres to experience the joys or woes of hill-walking, mountaineering, rock-climbing, canoeing, orienteering etc. Such visits have been made to Outdoor Education Centres in Recess in Connemara and in Tiglin in Wicklow. As well as visiting these centres, the V.P.T. classes have paid visits to such places as the National History Museum, St. Michael's Special School on the Raheny Road, the Chester Beatty Library, the Douglas Hyde Gallery and to Dáil Éireann.

The highlight of the year for the V.P.T. classes is the specially organised end-of-year function at which students are presented with Department Certificates. The presentations are usually made by some dignitary, and last year this function was performed by the Minister Dr. Michael Woods.

In September 1991 a major change of direction was made to the V.P.T. programme. While for ten years the

course had offered a broad range of modules to students, in 1991 it was decided that students should specialise, and a V.P.T.1 Hotel, Catering and Tourism Programme was introduced. Work placements are in restaurants, hotels, bars, supermarkets etc. and assessment of students of the course is monitored by C.E.R.T. At the end of the year, students receive a Certificate from C.E.R.T. and a V.P.T. Department of Education Certificate. The introduction of this new C.E.R.T. programme is proving worthwhile: the chef-uniformed students are making their presence felt, and are especially appreciated on coffee-mornings and restaurant-days when teachers avail of their home-made delights.

At the moment, this is the direction the V.P.T. programme is taking in Ardscoil La Salle. It has had adjustments and re-orientations in its short history to date. It is still alive and well. The present direction is still in its infancy. When it matures and develops, perhaps it will be called on to change course again. The nature of the V.P.T. programme calls for such adaptability and the school hopes to be ready at any time to meet the challenge.

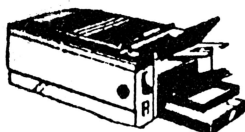
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The Transition Year Option

The Transition Year Option (TYO) which was introduced to the school in September 1991, is designed for students who have finished their Junior Certificate and who intend to do Leaving Certificate. Rather than proceed immediately to Fifth Year, students are provided with a year where the emphasis is on personal development and maturity.

The overall aims of the course are: to help the student to mature intellectually, emotionally and spiritually; to be more able for the demands of the Leaving Certificate; to be better able to make an informed career choice and to be a better communicator.

Among the subjects on offer in TYO are Personal and Social Development, Media Studies, English and Communications, Religious Studies, Irish, Foreign Languages, Art, Craft and Design, Drama, Computer Studies, Typing and Word Processing. As a project in

Business Studies, they also form a mini-company. During the year students have a period of Work Experience.

Several outings are organised throughout the year including a stay at an outdoor activity centre, an overnight retreat, a theatre trip and other educational trips. There is also an ongoing link with St. Michael's House and other opportunities for community involvement also arise.

Assessment is carried out on an ongoing basis and students have a number of projects and other work to complete. They also do self-assessment each month.

At the end of the year students are presented with a folder containing certificates of their achievements and reports from their work experience.

Youth Exchanges Eurodyssée and Lingua

Ardcoil La Salle in Raheny is one of the eleven exchange schools belonging to the European network of the Institut Saint Joseph, Ciney (Belgium). These twinnings started in 1986 and developed little by little until 1992, when, for the first time, the twelve E.E.C. countries were represented in Ciney for a EUODYSSÉE week during the Easter holidays. This EUODYSSÉE programme is based on the principle of exchange, which means that the Belgian student welcoming a foreign "twin" will at some time of the year travel abroad with a few fellow-students and be put up by his or her twin's family; the schools themselves organize various activities and excursions. The EUODYSSÉE week in Ciney is looked forward to by more than 150 students and about 30 teachers in Belgium as well as in the other E.E.C. countries. Not only do we aim at offering the youngsters an opportunity to discover Europe at low cost, but, by bringing them together, we want to make them aware of other types of mentality, other ways of thinking, other ways of living, so that they can realize that "difference" doesn't mean "strangeness" whatsoever. Ardscoil La Salle got involved in this project in 1991.

The E.E.C.-funded LINGUA programme, under whose banner Ardscoil La Salle and the Institut Saint Joseph collaborated in 1991-1992, adds to the above mentioned principle of exchange those of linguistic and cultural discovery: French/English learners got part of their fares paid by the E.E.C. to attend some classes in Belgium/Ireland and work at a common project, which was entitled: "Walloon/Irish identity in the French-speaking/Anglo-Saxon world."

In November 1991, 12 Belgian 6th formers lived the Irish way for two weeks. Included in the school timetable were

Geography, Religion, History, Economics, P.S.D., P.E., A.C.D., Irish (they learned some common expressions from "Fáilte" to "Slán agat"), English (analysis of the play "Philadelphia, Here I Come", by Brian Friel), French and Home Economics (where Guinness cake was baked). The Belgian guests also attended some lectures on different aspects of Irish culture and history such as the Famine, the 1916 Rising, James Joyce and William Macken. Some extra-curricular activities provided students with the opportunity to broaden their understanding and knowledge of Dublin, Ireland and its people; excursions to Glendalough, Avondale, Kilmainham Jail wonderfully illustrated what they had learned in class. The Belgian students greatly valued this stay: Irish warm-heartedness, perfect organization, and the realization that the "theoretical" English they had been studying at school for 6 years "worked" made their stay a memorable experience.

In February 1992, the Irish group came over to Belgium on the basis of the same principles and aims: language and culture learning. Excursions to Liège and Brussels complemented the classes. At the official meal, the Irish Ambassador in our capital emphasized the vital of such exchanges in today's Europe where the knowledge of foreign languages and the capacity to understand one's neighbour is of paramount importance.

We, at the Institut Saint Joseph, are convinced that our students benefit from these exchanges and that they must go on. We have the impression that Ardscoil La Salle share our point of view. That's why we hope other exchanges will be made possible in the future.

NEW HORIZONS

Not so many years ago the word "Europe", for second level students, was still, more or less, a geographical term confined to atlases and class textbooks. With Ireland's entry to the E.E.C., we had to become accustomed to a whole new vocabulary, of "Euro" words.

In early Spring 1991 a brochure arrived at Ardscoil La Salle inviting the school to take part in a week-long event called "Eurodyssée". This was the name given to an enterprising school exchange programme organised each Easter by Institut St. Joseph, Ciney, Belgium. It required a full-sized map of Belgium to help us locate the Walloon town of Ciney which, since that time, De La Salle students have visited on three different occasions.

Eurodyssée is a unique event. It brings together students from schools in each of the member-states of the E.E.C. Taking each year a different theme for study it offers the students an opportunity to meet in a truly educational environment, to take up the challenge of foreign travel with all it entails at an early age and to pre-empt, also at an early age, the artificial barriers conjured up by differences such as language and culture.

Ardscoil La Salle recognises the many advantages inherent in the event and is indebted to Institut St. Joseph for giving De La Salle students an opportunity to participate.

The advantages, of course, do not only accrue when the students are in Belgium. When the Belgian students and

their teachers come to Ardscoil La Salle, as they have done on three occasions to date, a new dimension is added to the routine of school-life. In particular, the language classes which they attend take on a new lease of life and the Irish students benefit greatly by the presence of their Belgian counterparts.

On mainland Europe the thrust of school tours is, and has been for some time, toward educational, linguistic and cultural exchanges. This, in a larger context, is what our Ambassador to Belgium, An t-Uas. S. O. Cleirigh was referring to in his address at the official function to mark the end of the Lingua exchange of 91/92 in Belgium, when he said

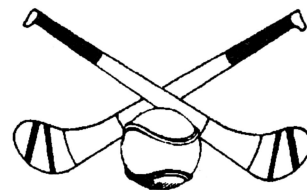
"L'Irlande a choisi pour l'Europe."

Ardscoil La Salle, too, has made its choice and looks forward to continuing and developing its contact with mainland Europe and particularly with Institut St. Joseph, Ciney on its yearly "odyssey". By so doing it is hoped that the Ardscoil La Salle students who benefit from this contact may, in the future, reach for their atlases and open them to view Europe and European travel not as a daunting prospect but as a challenge to be confidently accepted, and an opportunity to seek new horizons.

These exchanges promote the integration of young people of European background. That Ireland is an island state makes it all the more important that our students participate.

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THE PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

JOHN BURNS



The opening of Ard Scoil La Salle in 1968 coincided with the final stages of the completion of the Grange Park and Woodbine estates, whose newcomers immediately set about forming a Residents' Association. As the developers and planning authorities did not include any provision for social or recreational activities in their plans, one of the first problems facing the new association was to find accommodation for these purposes. The members turned to the newly opened College, which was immediately placed at the disposal of the residents outside school hours, and was used by many first-time home-makers to perfect their housekeeping, culinary and other skills under local expert guidance.

On Saturday mornings, dozens of young children were cared for and entertained by voluntary helpers in the pre-fab buildings where the sports wing now stands. In the evenings, the same location was used for games and film shows for the older children. These are but a few examples of the activities which were organised and flourished in the friendly atmosphere generated. A very beneficial outcome of all of these activities was the bringing together of the new residents - drawn as they were from every part of the city and country - and the resulting spirit of mutual help and co-operation has since served the area and the school well.

In the early 1970's, the Residents' Association combined with other voluntary groups to acknowledge in a practical form the College's contribution to the life of the area, and at the same time to provide much needed facilities for the students. Towards this end, a raffle was organised to raise funds for the purchase of the College's first minibus. Out of this, the Parents' Association developed with the help of additional volunteers from Swan's Nest, Mount Olive and the much wider areas from which students were drawn. In an article of this nature, it would be difficult to cover in detail the Association's total financial contribution over the years or the projects to which these funds were applied, but some idea may be gained by mentioning a few examples, viz., purchase of books for the library; the

installation of the inter-com system; substantial contributions towards the new sports wing; provision of typewriters, computers and machinery for the engineering and woodwork rooms; maintenance and repair or replacement of equipment or fixtures not funded by government departments.

At the same time, it would be a mistake to convey the impression that fundraising was or continues to be the only concern of the Association. In the early years, it participated in steps to overcome the problem of insufficient places to accommodate the number of students seeking admission to local second-level colleges. Prior to the setting up of the Board of Management, it liaised with and provided a feed-back to the College in regard to day-to-day problems. When help permitted, a canvass of local employers was carried out in an effort to place school leavers in employment, and a number of sub-committees provided sports, social activities and education/careers information. In recent years, mock interviews have been arranged, and a careers exhibition/information session was organised in co-operation with the teachers. Last year a very successful art exhibition was held in which the works of past pupils were included. These activities, together with three to four fundraising functions in the year, make undue demands on the time and physical resources of the too few parents willing to assist, and it would be difficult to find adequate words to pay tribute to those parents whose enthusiasm and hard work kept the Association going over the past twenty-five years in the interests of the College and its students.

What of the future? Media reports of green papers and white papers indicate that changes in the whole educational system are likely to demand greater involvement by parents, and that the necessity for an active and informed Parents' Association will be no less urgent in the future than it was twenty five years ago.

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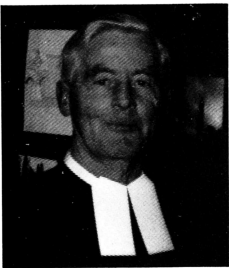
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THE QUIET MAN OF DE LA SALLE

BRO. CANICE KEARNEY – A Profile



To most of the student population Bro. Canice is the “Quiet Man” of De La Salle – stepping along briskly, umbrella in hand, with black peaked cap and wearing a permanent smile. Those of us who know him better are aware that he is a

man who has been steeped in education in the past, who was a Principal of two schools, who speaks Latin, French and Irish fluently and who has travelled widely in the far reaches of the Earth from Australia to China.

From Kilkenny, a shy youth with hurley in hand walked into the Novitiate in Castletown, Mountrath, in 1928. He trained as a primary teacher in De La Salle, Waterford between 1931 and 1933. While the German Army was making a battlefield of Europe during World War II, he registered as a B.A. student

in U.C.D., and with three years’ study behind him he graduated in 1946.

Having held teaching posts in Castletown and Mallow, he was called upon to work as Principal in Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal from 1958-1964. By the end of 1964 he was heading southwards to Skibbereen where he was Principal until 1970. In September 1970 he was on the last teaching lap. His services were required in the recently opened Ardscoil La Salle as a teacher of Mathematics, Latin and Irish.

This new ‘country boy’ settled in quickly, getting involved in local G.A.A. matters and visiting his beloved ‘CROKER’ on most Sundays. Since the Sam Maguire Cup went to Donegal in 1992 we are still trying to figure out which side of the face has the deeper smile! The Quiet Man of the De La Salle does not always reveal his innermost thoughts.

The Lasallian Educational Community

Two years ago the De La Salle Brothers met together to evaluate their work in education and to plan for the future. In order to help them in their deliberations, they invited a number of parents, teachers, students and past pupils from their various schools throughout the country to a special meeting. During that meeting the different representatives shared with the Brothers their particular concerns, hopes and needs as well as their suggestions for improving the quality of service which could be provided in De La Salle schools. As a result of those discussions, the idea of the Lasallian Educational Community became a reality.

Very simply it means that the school is seen as a community of three main interest groups – parents, teachers and students. Each group has a valuable contribution to make to its own members as well as to the other groups. The basic aim is to develop closer co-operation between the various groups in order to meet the needs of all concerned in a happier, less stressful, more understanding and more satisfying atmosphere. In other words, we are trying to develop genuine partnership in our schools.

HOME – School – Liaison

"The development of effective links between school and home enhances children's participation in education and also helps parents and children to develop more positive attitudes towards education and school." (Green Paper, 1992).

The effectiveness of this 'Green Paper' statement can be greatly reinforced by the appointment of regular 'liaison persons' at both first and second level education.

Teachers who are preoccupied with very large classes and an examination-orientated curriculum can be short on time and space to deal adequately with the needs of pupils, particularly those at risk. Pupils need someone they can talk to, express their feelings to and have an open and frank discussion with; some member of the staff who is available to them at all times, and who can emphasise the positive aspect of each pupil and thereby enhance his/her self-esteem or self-worth.

On a practical level I have received a very positive response from teachers, parents and pupils. At present I'm dealing with first year pupils only, whom I have met on an individual basis. I try to create an atmosphere whereby the pupils feel free to express their feelings. I have already visited sixty per cent of their homes and everywhere I have been received very positively. By visiting the homes of the pupils I am going back to the real centre of education, the point at which it all began, as the parents are the principal educators of their children. I think that it is of paramount importance to reinforce this truth.

Les Jeunes et la C.E.: Sondage

* La plupart des jeunes croient que l'apprentissage des langues sera de plus en plus importante. Il paraît que les jeunes lorgnent le marché du travail.

* S'ils avaient eu le droit de voter le jour du referendum récent, ils auraient voté en grande partie pour la ratification du Traité de Maastrichte, en expliquant que, du fond, l'Irlande a besoin de la C.E.

* S'ils avaient la choix, ils choisiraient l'Allemagne pour y habiter.

* La raison? - plus de possibilités au marché du travail.

Gaisce - The President's Award is the nation's highest Award to Irish young people between the ages of 15 and 25. It is awarded for personal excellence, achievement and voluntary service. Entering the Award offers you an exciting challenge to test your discipline, initiative, leadership and caring skills. Through this you can advance your own personal development, career success and happiness.

Participants are encouraged through its programmes and activities to help develop skills and interests which can be pursued further later on in life.

The programmes will also help develop an interest in community service and caring for others. If a participant earns the President's Award they will have learned endurance and staying power and will have risen to the very personal challenge it offers.

It takes about six to nine months to complete the activities for a bronze award; one and a half years for a silver award and two years for a gold award.

A similar type of award operates in over 50 other countries world-wide, e.g. in the UK it is the very prestigious Duke of Edinburgh's Award. In America it is known as the Congressional Award.

The Award is promoted and encouraged by the largest employers in the country, e.g. the ESB, who encourage their apprentices to participate in either the silver or gold award so as to develop themselves personally, the Gardai and all the major hospitals in Dublin.

In 1986, Ardscoil La Salle in Raheny was one of the first schools in the country to operate the Award, under the watchful eyes of President's Award leaders Mr. John Slattery and Ms. Mary Kinsella.

A PERSONAL EXPERIENCE

NIAL DEEGAN (5TH YEAR)

In 1991, I was involved in the Bronze Medal Section of the President's Award Scheme at Ardscoil La Salle. The project was broken down into three main sections.

● COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

I worked at the retirement home, Sybil Hill, Raheny, which is run by the Little Sisters of the Poor. My work involved serving the evening meal, washing up, and frequently chatting to the residents and the sisters.

● PERSONAL SKILL

I undertook a study of the Holocaust during World War II. The details of European persecution of the Jews made my blood curdle. History came alive for me and, in addition, I developed research skills.

● PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

This course, involving regular training and healthy eating, was a new discipline for me, and I learned a great deal about the body's strengths and weaknesses.

My day of glory finally arrived in May 1992, when I was called to the National Concert Hall to be presented with my Bronze medal award by Dr. Michael Woods.

One month later, I began my effort to win the Silver medal award, and hope that in 1993 I will mount the medals stand again.

I would encourage all of my fellow pupils to get involved in the President's Award Scheme; besides acquiring new skills, you will be not just part of your school group, but also part of a national group as well. The achievement of such an award will also make a welcome addition to your C.V. when applying for a job!

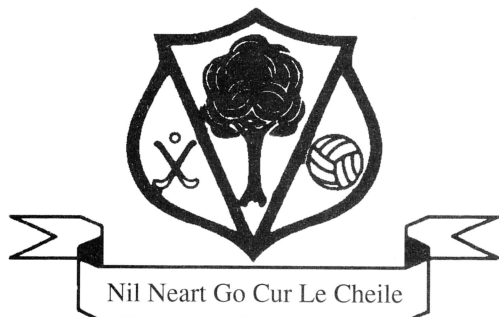

Sports Round-Up

GENE HENRY

Since its foundation in 1968, a high level of involvement in sports activities has been maintained on a continuous basis in Ardscoil La Salle. In many respects the growth and changes which have taken place over the years have been reflected in the variety and character of the games on offer. An example of this may be seen in the radical change in the P.E. area since the building of the Sports Hall in 1986. Some of us can recall the situation in the 1970's (before the Co-ed. days) when P.E. classes consisted solely of internal leagues in soccer and gaelic. In the years before the Donahies Community School ever saw the light of day, students and teachers trudged across to Millbrook once a week to play these games, often in the most adverse of weather conditions. I often wonder was it not enough to turn the less enthusiastic participants off sport for life. The students of today seem to appreciate their vastly improved P.E. facilities.

Highlights of the 70's

Despite the hardships of those earlier days, there are quite a number of fond sporting memories worth recalling from the first decade of the school's existence. Within five years of its establishment, the first successes were recorded.

In 1973, the 'Della' won the Dublin U/15 and U/17 Gaelic Football Competitions, under the watchful eye of Bro. Declan, whose coaching methods may have been unorthodox, but were nonetheless very

effective. An indication of the changes that have taken place since then is the fact that both finals were played in what was then known as the Oval, the home ground of St. Vincents Club, on which the housing estate of Tuscany Downs/Ashcroft has since been built. Among the players who contributed to those early victories were Pat O'Donovan, John McCreevy, Colin Tracey, Dermot Walshe and Tony Nealon in the junior final; Brendan McDermott, Joe Cassidy, Ken Fogarty and Tom O'Donovan in the senior competitions. (Tom,

incidentally, is now a partner in a law firm with current government Minister Brian Cowen).

The other title success of the decade in Gaelic games was in 1978 when the U/14 Hurlers won the Dublin 'C' League. Bro. Canice, who was in charge of that particular team recalls the final being played in the Civil Service Grounds, Islandbridge, at the unusually early time of 11.00 a.m. in the morning. Enda Mulcahy, Ciaran Dunne and Joe McCormack were among the leading performers in that successful squad.

All Ireland Champions

During the late seventies Table Tennis had its most successful years with teams winning many major titles at various levels. All Ireland Senior titles were won three times: 1978, '79 and '80. All Ireland Junior Schools titles were captured in 1978 and '79. Ranking competitions provided the opportunity for individuals to represent Leinster and Ireland at youth level. The players to achieve this very high status were Peter McCabe; Ian Lynagh, Anthony Green, Martin Roche, Bernard Duffy and Cathal McGee. Teachers involved in coaching these players included Bro. Declan, Mr. Fallon and Bro. Anthony.

From about the mid 70's onwards Soccer began to

move into centre stage as the dominant field game in the school. In 1977 the first major success was recorded when the senior team won the Leinster Schools Qualifying Cup. This talented squad included players such as John Kelly (Captain), Niall O'Baoill, Tony O'Rourke, Anthony McMacken, Dennis O'Donovan and Michael Egan, and were whipped into shape by the energetic Dennis Finn.

The Teachers' Team

A review of the 1970's would undoubtedly be somewhat incomplete without some reference to that motley crew masquerading as a soccer team, who, it could be argued, added a new dimension to the game of soccer in winning the Teachers' North City Soccer League. It may come as a sobering thought to some of the participants of that particular 'team' to know that many of the students they taught in the 70's are now married and with offspring about to enter Second Level education. Hardly the type of information to tempt the likes of Swan, McHugh, Jordan, Power, Henry, Moriarty, Fallon and Cullen to consider an Eoin Liston style comeback to footballing fame.

The 1980's

The new decade opened on a high note on the soccer scene. In that first year (1980) the senior team, still with Denis Finn at the helm, again made its appearance in Tolka Park to capture the Leinster Qualifying Cup for the second time. The famous Irish victory over Rumania in the 1990 World Cup brought back memories of that particular occasion, as the game ended in a draw after extra time, only to be decided in our favour after a penalty shoot-out, which left the 'Della' fans in ecstasy, but with finger nails considerably reduced in length. Among the players to participate in that exciting event were Pierce Walsh, Captain, and schoolboy international (now with Derry City) Declan Soady, David Dillon, Thomas Whitacre, John McCarthy, Gay and Jim O'Carroll.

The senior soccer team was back again in 1981 in the even more prestigious Leinster Senior Cup Final, with a 6.30 p.m. kick-off against Greenhills College at Dalymount Park. In conversation recently, Mr. O'Brien recalled the decisive turning point in that particular game, when Ard Scoil suffered the misfortune of seeing a Pierce Walsh goal disallowed. Immediately Greenhills retaliated by shooting the ball past keeper Kevin Lawlor at

the opposite end of the pitch. In the following year, our U/14 squad reached the Leinster final in Tolka Park, once again to suffer defeat at the hands of Greenhills by a similar 1 - 0 score line.

Third Time Lucky

In 1987 we again qualified for the Leinster Senior Cup Final in Tolka Park against neighbouring school, the Donahies. This game, though played throughout in a very sporting manner had all the competitive bite of a local derby. When the full time whistle sounded it was the Donahies that emerged as victors by the now familiar 1 - 0 margin. How much sweeter, therefore, was the victory in the following year 1988, when Ian Moran, captain for the second successive year, led his team-mates to a well deserved 3 - 2 victory over Marian College, again in Tolka Park. Third time lucky! Ardscoil had finally taken the Leinster Senior Cup. The photographs in our school display case still remind us of the sheer exhilaration of victory on an afternoon when such were the playing conditions that the pitch might more accurately be described as a quagmire than as a proper footballing surface. In both '87 and '88, the senior team were under the management team of John Maguire and Dave Madden.

On the soccer front the 80's ended, as it began, on a successful note, as our U/14 squad repeated in 1989 the achievement of the previous year, in taking the Leinster Cup back to Raheny. Mr. Crowley still modestly claims it would have been an embarrassment not to have commandeered this title with his unique and skilful squad which included a set of triplets (the Farrellys), twins (the Lawlesses); in addition to other very talented players: Morris, O'Donaghue, Lawlor, Wyer, Fitzpatrick and Jones.

The Gaelic Scene

The year 1981 was a very significant one for Gaelic games in the school. In that year a young crop of First Years entered who were to display an abundance of footballing talent. They made their mark almost immediately by taking the Dublin U/14 'B' Title in 1982, defeating St. Declan's Cabra on the hallowed Croke Park turf. Two years later under the guidance of Mr. Cullen and Mr. McBride, they were back again to contest the U/16 title against Colaiste Choilm, Swords. The game ended in a draw. Perhaps one of the most significant aspects of that particular game was the realisation felt by some of the more discerning De La Salle supporters that we were looking at a football star

of the future. The immaculate fielding and all-round football skills displayed by Vinny Murphy on that occasion were - to use an Americanism - 'from the top shelf'. Congrats, Vinny, on your recent well deserved 'All Star Award'! Hopefully it will soon be accompanied by that much coveted All-Ireland medal.

In the replay in Parnell Park, the team captained by Shane Kerrigan, had absorbed the lessons of the previous game, and so took the Dublin U/16 'B' title in decisive fashion. A few months later they returned to that same venue to capture the Leinster U/16 'B' Cup. Incidentally, their victim on this occasion was Colaiste Choilm once again. Two years later virtually the same squad proceeded to claim the Dublin U/18 'B' title, even if by a very narrow margin, in a replay against Rosmini, played in Islandbridge on a bitterly cold January afternoon. In that same year many of those same players were members of the U/18 hurling team, captained by Niall Crowther and managed by Mr. O'Brien, which also defeated Rosmini in the Dublin U/18 'C' final in Croke Park. So by the time this particular batch of students graduated, they had become well and truly accustomed to the big

occasion and to the roar of their supporters in both Croke Park and Parnell Park.

As in soccer, the 1980's also ended on a successful note. The U/14 squad displayed admirable grit and determination in overcoming not only their Wexford opponents but also the atrocious weather conditions, to take the newly inaugurated Leinster Colleges 'C' title. Many of the players on that occasion were dual performers who experienced double success, both as members of the Gaelic team and also members of the soccer team which won the Leinster Soccer Cup.

The Girls make their Mark

In the late 1970's the first girl students entered Ard Scoil and, to be honest, in the early years they were poorly catered for with regard to extra-curricular activities. However, the situation began gradually to change. The earliest recorded sporting success in girls' competitions were in Basketball. In 1983 and '84 the school won quite a number of titles in this field. Dublin Senior 'B' Champions (1983 & '84). Dublin Intermediate 'C' Champions (1984), All Ireland Junior 'C' and Intermediate 'C' Champions 1984. These teams included players such as Debbie and Ann Dowling, Leonie Whitacre, Josephine Lawler, Jean and Ann O'Connor, and

were coached by Ms. Redmond, the P.E Teacher. Jean O'Connor later played National League Division 1 Basketball with Corinthians and Camogie with Dublin. Her sister Ann was a member of the U/17 Irish Basketball team, and now plays National League Division 1 with Killester.

Girl's Soccer

A few years later Girls' Soccer began and has been going strong ever since, encouraged in the early stages by Ms. Redmond, John Maguire and Dave Madden, and more recently by the energetic Ms. Ní Raghallaigh. Since 1987 in particular, hardly a year has gone by without one or more girls' soccer teams contesting the final stages of their competitions. One of the earliest stars was Julie Kavanagh, who captained the U/16 team in the 1987 final and who later player on the Dublin Girls' Gaelic Football team which won the All-Ireland Junior title. In 1988 she returned to the school to help coach the teams which won the girls' Cup and Shield Competitions. (Some of the boys, such as David Whyte, Michael Kavanagh and Luke Farrelly, have also helped out in this way). A number of students at present in Fifth Year: Tracey Cleary, Pamela Curtis, Maria Fox, Linda Grehan, Jennifer Griffiths, Tanya Grehan, Gillian Nolan, Oriana Stewart, Tanya Byrne and Orla Giles have a

collection of trophies on their sideboards as Leinster Cup and League Champions in 1990 and finalists in 1991. Perhaps the game that stands out most vividly as one full of drama was the final against Greendale in Hadden Park. Shortly after the game commenced, a severe thunder and lightning storm erupted which very few of those present, whether players or spectators, are likely ever to forget. No one more so than Bro. Canice, as a flash of lightning struck the spectator railing on which he was leaning. Fortunately, he escaped with nothing more than a severe fright. The game was abandoned for about thirty minutes, as players and spectators huddled together in the porchway of the club bar. When the storm had passed over, the game resumed. Thanks to the two well-taken goals, one by Jennifer Griffiths, the other by Linda Grehan, the De La Salle Girls had, at least, the final satisfaction of taking the Cup home with them.

Badminton

As soon as the new Sports Hall was opened, Badminton was born. The first girls' team competed in the Leinster Championships of 1989. Having reached the Leinster Final (Div. A) of that year, they managed a draw but had to be satisfied with 'runner-up' prize in the replay. (Team: L. Corr, E. O'Neill, J. Murphy and V. Corr).

In 1990 Valerie Corr was replaced by Michelle O'Brien, then on the Leinster and All-Ireland squads. Again this team reached the Leinster Final (Div.A) to be once more in the 'runners-up' "enclosure".

Champions at Last!

Luck smiled in 1991 as a fresh and very efficient U/14 boys team took the Leinster Championship (Div.B) by storm to become the first Ardscoil La Salle Leinster Champions in Badminton. (Team: F. O'Brien, P. Walsh, K. McKeon and K. Hollingsworth).

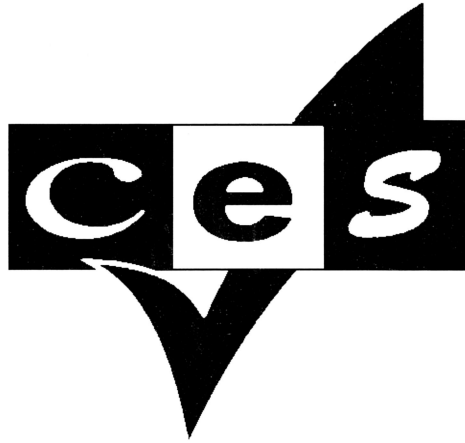
With K. Maher replacing K. Hollingsworth this team again reached semi-final level in 1992. (U/16). This year the boys Badminton team had considerable success once more. The team of Finbar O'Brien, Mark McKeown, Kieran Maher and Cormack O'Brien competed in two finals on the same day, winning the U/16 Div. 2 Final against Old Bawn and runners-up in the Div. 1 Final against Templeogue.

Congratulations to all those who have taken part in the various sporting activities over the years. They have left some very worthwhile memories. This involvement has, I feel, contributed significantly in helping students to identify in a positive way with Ardscoil La Salle.
