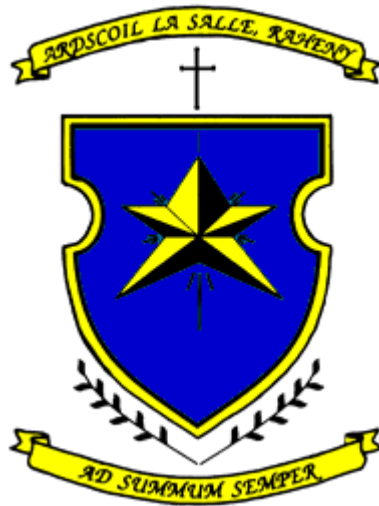

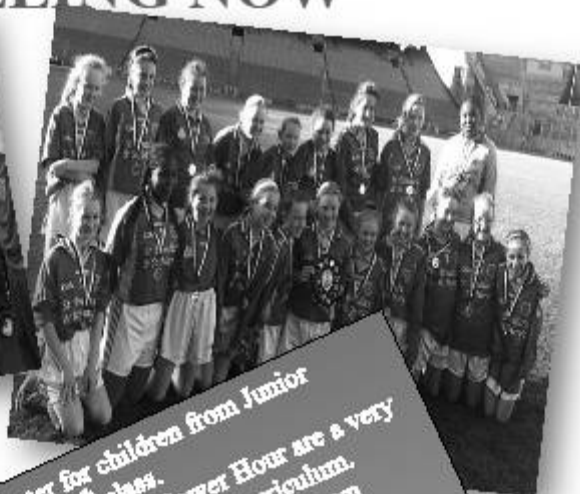

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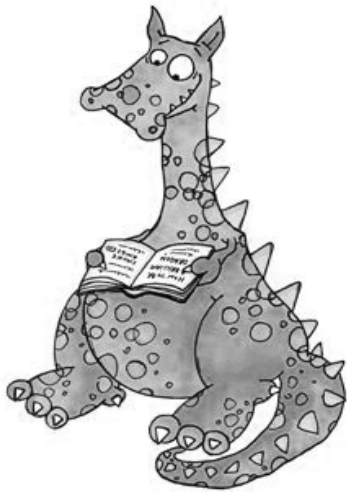

Student Leadership and Maths is a ten-week pilot programme aimed at TY/fifth year students in Trinity College, Dublin.

Students from different schools came to Trinity on Saturday mornings for maths activity and **personal development** activities (public speaking, organising, team-building, teaching maths etc.)

This project was run in conjunction with Voluntary Tuition Programme, Trinity Scholars and the School of Education in Trinity. Each participant learned how to set up and run their own maths club for 1st/2nd years using the resources of **Khan Academy** (a fantastic, free online platform interactive of thousands of videos and activities - www.khanacademy.org).

Three of our students from Transition Year and 5th year volunteered for SLAM training. While some of our current first year students have trialled the Khan Academy learning resources, website and apps. With the support of these students we will begin our **1st Year Maths Club** in the autumn 2014.

Our Le Chéile Conference 2014

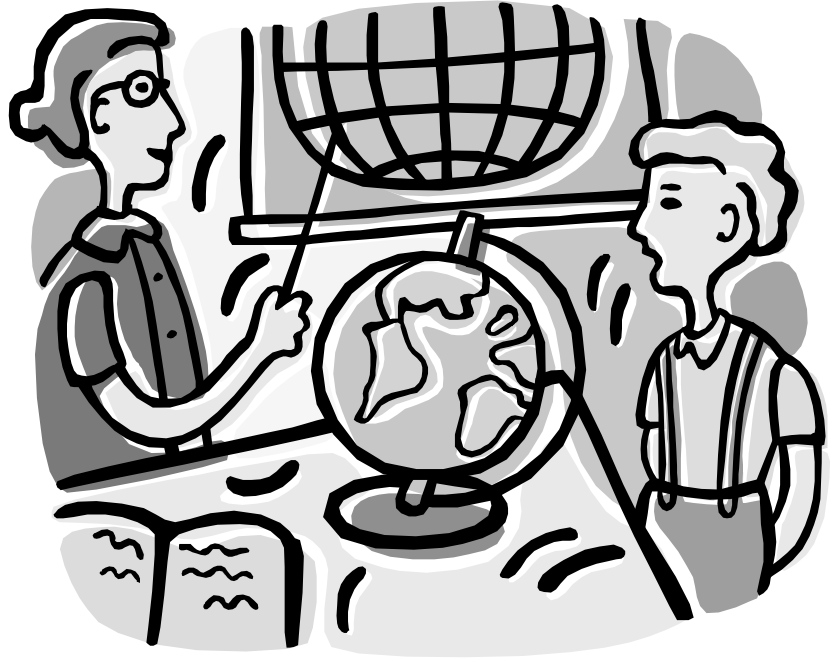

Street Law



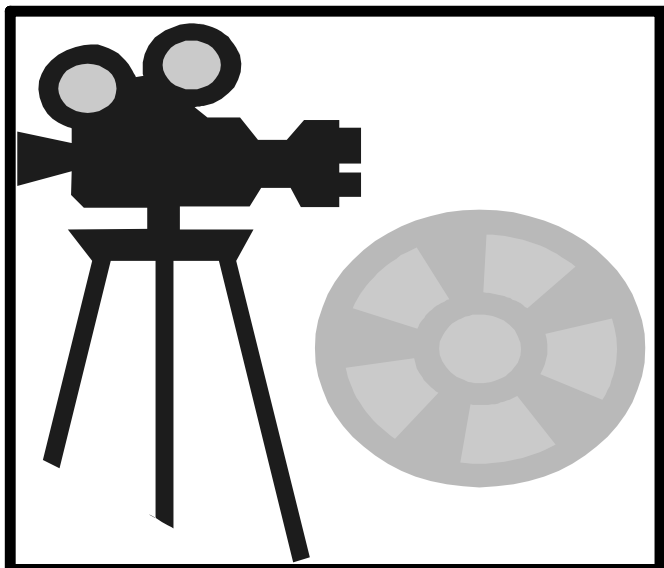

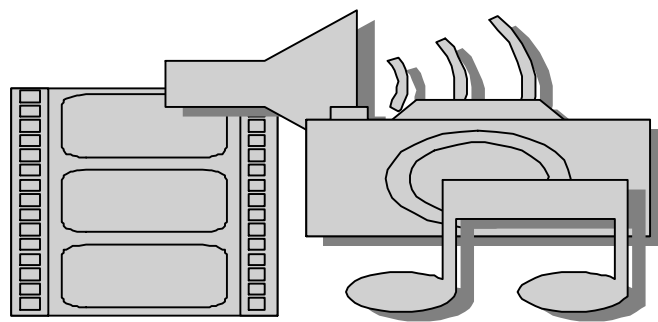

Paired Reading



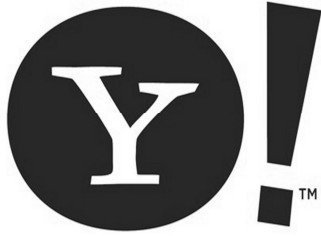

The Action Project can seem daunting at first but it's actually pretty straightforward once you take it in simple steps.

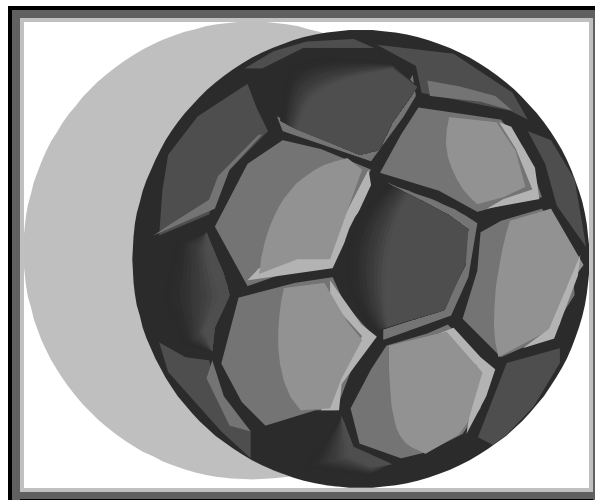

T.Y Boxing

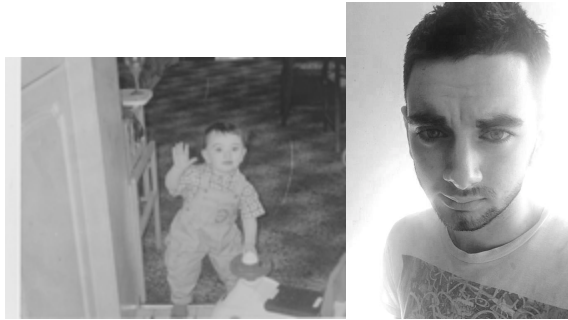
